10 Cultural Highlights

in the UK City of Culture 2025



Perhaps the most famous literary family the country has produced, the Brontës were born in Thornton and spent most of their lives in Haworth.

Their life and work are celebrated in Haworth's Brontë Parsonage Museum, which is a short walk away from the unspoiled area of south Pennine hills that inspired works including Wuthering Heights.

The Alhambra

Opened in 1914, Bradford's 1400 capacity Alhambra
Theatre is regarded as a 'jewel in the crown' of northern theatre. The venue hosts a range of major touring companies including Northern Ballet and the National
Theatre and has staged major West End shows with more to come in 2024, including
Wicked and Disney's Aladdin. It's also home to one of the most popular pantomimes in the UK.

UNESCO City of Film

Bradford is the world's first UNESCO City of Film. This title bestows international recognition on Bradford as a world centre for film because of the city's rich film heritage, its inspirational movie locations and its many celebrations of the moving image through film related events and unique approach to learning about and with film.

Incredible Scenery

One of the best things of all about Bradford is its stunning natural beauty.

With a fine mixture of deep valleys, rolling hills and rugged moorland, it is full of character and places to explore. Special mentions go to Ilkley Moor and Brontë Country, but you're never too far from the inspirational outdoors.

Amazing Architecture

Bradford is home to one of the finest collections of Victorian buildings in the UK.

City Hall and the Wool Exchange – now a rather special Waterstones bookshop - are superb examples of Gothic exuberance, while the commercial district of Little Germany contains no less than 55 listed buildings.



David Hockney

David Hockney was born on July 9th, 1937 in Bradford, and studied at Bradford School of Art in the 1950s before going on to become one of the most influential and best-loved artists of the 20th century.

His ties to Bradford are still strong, with large collections of his work on display at Salts Mill 1853 Gallery and The David Hockney Gallery at Cartwright Hall.


Vibrant Events

Saltaire, World Heritage Site

Take a glimpse at the past. UNESCO World Heritage Site Saltaire is a unique Victorian 'model' industrial village, established in 1850s by wool baron Sir Titus Salt. Built from honey-coloured stone in neo-Italianate style and surrounded by hills, spectacular bluebell woods and moorland, this beautiful village now beats with a creative heart.







Bradford is a diverse and historic city enhanced by stunning architecture and a thriving cultural scene.

The city of Bradford has a fascinating history, growing from a small rural settlement to an industrial powerhouse dubbed the 'Wool Capital of the World' in the Victorian era. Lavish Victorian architecture from that period is still much in evidence today.

Recognised as a UNESCO City of Film, the city is a wonderful place to enjoy cinema as well as being a popular filming location. The city centre is home to a wonderful concentration of heritage buildings, the stunning City Park water feature and some superb museums including the National Science & Media Museum. With venues such as Kala Sangam, Bradford Playhouse,

The Alhambra Theatre and St George's Hall offering a fantastic programme of live events, it's no surprise Bradford has been named UK City of Culture 2025.

With a compact, easy to explore city centre, Bradford also has plenty of choice when it comes to shopping, food & drink and cultural attractions, making it perfect for anyone looking for a mixture of heritage, culture and character.

Explore the rich history of Bradford by visiting Bolling Hall, Bradford Industrial Museum and Cartwright Hall art gallery. These attractions are conveniently located near the city centre and can be easily accessed by public transport.





Bolling Hall Museum

One of Bradford's oldest buildings, during the Civil War the household supported the Royalist cause and Bolling Hall was a stronghold during the 'Siege of Bradford'. Nowadays it is a heritage museum with rooms furnished and decorated to give a taste of life at different periods of the house's 500 year history.

Undercliffe Cemetery

Described as one of the most striking achievements of Victorian funerary design, you'll find grand nineteenth-century monuments, elaborate tombs, finely decorated obelisks and extravagant mausoleums, along with sweeping views over the city.

The listed monuments, amongst others, have QR codes so that you can find out more about who they commemorate with a click of your smart phone.

Shopping

If you're in the city centre to shop, then **The Broadway Shopping Centre** is definitely the best place to start. The city's main shopping centre offers a range of high street brands including **Superdry, Marks and Spencer, Next, Skechers, Khaadi,** and many more.

More high street names can be found at **Forster Square Retail Park**, and at the **Kirkgate Centre** on Darley Street. Opening in 2024 the **Darley Street Market** will provide a new shopping destination, showcasing local independent traders in a fresh vibrant location.



Bradford on Film Bradford is the world's first **UNESCO** City of Film. This permanent designation gives Bradford international recognition as a world centre for film for the city's rich film heritage, inspiring film locations, as well as the city's film festivals, film-related events and unique ways of learning about film. Bradford has been a filming location since the beginning of cinema, with its indigenous film industry being traced back to the years around the First World War. On Location


In Bradford, you'll find popular filming locations including City Hall and the historic area of Little Germany, which have been featured in films such as Official Secrets and The Duke. Ilkley Moor has also been a backdrop for films like Calendar Girls and Ali & Ava. Saltaire and Salts Mill are known hotspots for film and TV productions, with shows like The ABC Murders and Peaky Blinders being filmed there. And in Keighley, the iconic Oakworth station from The Railway Children is a must-visit for fans of the film.

The Magic of the Big Screen

Bradford is a great place to experience film, with a diverse range of cinemas to suit all movie-goers. The National Science and Media Museum's **Pictureville** screens Cinerama, world cinema, classic, and independent films. **The Light at Broadway** offers luxury with reclining seats, while **Cineworld** shows international blockbusters and Bollywood movies. **Keighley Picture House**, open since 1912, has two comfortable auditoriums. **Ilkley Cinema** is a small independent picture house with a modern bar, auditorium drinks service, and comfy sofas.









Home of the famous **Brontë sisters**, Haworth attracts visitors from all around the world to take in the sites that inspired their famous works.

On the edge of the Pennines, the Haworth known by the Brontës was a working village, producing worsted yarn and cloth. However the village was soon to become a site of literary pilgrimage. The Brontë Society was founded in 1893 and visitors have made their way to this iconic location ever since.

With its characterful cobbled Main Street, historic parsonage and epic rolling moors, the picturesque village of Haworth has a very special vintage charm that has made it a popular visitor attraction for many years. Around the villages and countryside of


Brontë country you will find lots more to discover.

Keighley is a busy town, with a selection of shops, cafés and restaurants around the Airedale Shopping Centre, Cavendish Street and North Street. While in the area enjoy a pint from the well-known local brewery Timothy Taylor.

Brontë Parsonage Museum

Set between the unique village of Haworth, and the wild moorland beyond, this elegant Georgian house was home to Charlotte, Emily and Anne Brontë from 1820 to 1861. The house still retains the atmosphere of the Brontës' time, with the rooms they once used filled with their furniture, clothes and personal possessions.

Haworth Main Street

Stroll down the steep Main Street and experience the charm of Haworth. This well-known spot has been featured on TV and in films and is lined with delightful shops, cafés, and pubs, creating a warm and inviting atmosphere. Enjoy the scenery, including the nearby Parish Church and Brontë Parsonage Museum.

Top Withens

Top Withens is a ruined farmhouse near Haworth, which is said to have been the inspiration for Wuthering Heights, the novel by Emily Brontë. The ruin lies on the Pennine Way and is a popular walking destination from Haworth and Stanbury. Such is the attraction to Japanese literary tourists that some footpath signs in the area include directions in Japanese.

Central Park

Haworth's Central Park is the perfect place to relax or go for a stroll. Its pretty flower garden, play area and bowls are popular with locals and visitors. The park hosts a monthly artisan market, and occasional live performances on the bandstand.

Keighley and Worth Valley Railway

The KWVR heritage railway runs from Keighley to Oxenhope through beautiful Brontë Country. Board a vintage steam train and enjoy a five mile journey steeped in industrial heritage and the beautiful countryside immortalised by the Brontë sisters. The railway hosts regular events and experiences throughout the year.

Shopping

Haworth offers a memorable shopping experience with a fine array of independent shops lining the steeply cobbled Main Street. There you can pick up everything from vintage clothing and jewellery to specialist books, original art and traditional sweets. Be sure to also check out the Cabinet of Curiosities, Hawksbys Gallery and Modo & Co. In Keighley, The Airedale Shopping **Centre** is home to a number of high street retailers while Cavendish Street and The Royal Arcade are the place to go for boutique businesses including the excellent Aire Valley Guitars and Blue Ginger Boutique.





Cliffe Castle Museum

Set within a grand public park, this former mansion house is now a large museum with a wide variety of displays, including Victorian rooms and furniture, paintings and decorative art. Dedicated galleries feature natural history, archaeology and social history.



Characterised by wide tree-lined streets, against the dramatic backdrop of Ilkley Moor, the elegant town of Ilkley is the ideal place to relax and treat yourself.

Ilkley rose to fame as a Spa town in the nineteenth century when thousands — including **Charles Darwin** — visited for fresh air, good food and the lively social scene. Grand hydro hotels were developed and wealthy visitors arrived by coach to 'take the waters' at White Wells.

Ilkley continues to embrace its Victorian character, while offering the very best leisure and retail experience. There are excellent restaurants and a wonderful selection of independent retailers selling everything from jewellery to books and designer clothing.

Enjoy afternoon tea at the famous **Bettys Café and Tea Rooms**, relaxing strolls through the **Riverside Gardens** and some stunning walks in the surrounding moorland. Ilkley is incredibly popular with walkers and cyclists thanks to its outstanding scenery and challenging terrain.

The town is the official starting point of the Dales Way – a long distance trail through the Yorkshire Dales finishing at Bowness-on-Windermere.

If you're on two wheels, the climb to the Cow and Calf Rocks is an iconic cycling challenge which has been tackled by the professionals in the Tour de Yorkshire.





Ilkley Moor and Cow and Calf Rocks

Ilkley Moor is the perfect place not only to appreciate the panoramic views, but to also sample one of Ilkley's greatest attractions – its walking. Famous for the Yorkshire anthem "On Ilkley Moor baht 'at", the moor is also a Site of Special Scientific Interest due to its upland habitat for ground-nesting birds.

Across the moor there are 400 carvings, known as 'cup and ring stones'. Thought to date from the early Bronze Age, around 1800 BC, their purpose remains a mystery to this day. Features like this make the moor a fascinating place, and a wonderful walk at all times of the year. From White Wells to the Cow and Calf, there's plenty to see – particularly in late July when the heathers bloom.

High on Ilkley Moor the Cow and Calf Rocks are a large rock formation consisting of an outcrop and boulder, also known as Hangingstone Rocks. They are so named because one is large, with the smaller one sitting close to it, like a cow and calf. According to local legend, the Calf was split from the Cow when the giant Rombald was fleeing an enemy, and stamped on the rock as he leapt across the valley.

The rocks are a great place to climb and the moor offers spectacular views of Ilkley and beyond.

Ilkley Lido

If you don't mind the chill then take the plunge at one of the country's few remaining outdoor pools. With plenty of space for sunbathing and picnics, there's a real seaside atmosphere in summer months as well as fantastic views over Ilkley Moor.

White Wells

Originally built around 1700 as an open air spa on the moor, and still operates today for those that would like to take the plunge. For those that want to stay dry, the cottage, café and museum display make for a lovely stop on a trip around the moor.

Located where the town meets the moor, this open space, with a paved maze and plenty of space for a picnic, is inspired by the history of likley, including a stay by Charles Darwin.

Ilkley Manor House

Ilkley Manor House is one of Ilkley's oldest buildings, with parts dating back to the mid-14th century. It is now used as a museum, arts and heritage centre. Self-guided tours of the historic building are available, along with an interpretation panel of the Roman fort.

Dales Way



Exploring the Outdoors



Renowned for our rolling hills and rugged moorland, Bradford district is a paradise for walkers and cyclists and depending when you visit, the countryside can be either tranquil and inviting or wild and windswept.

The beautiful countryside and open spaces that make Bradford district so picturesque and inviting are home to many fantastic walks and cycle routes, taking in iconic locations and spectacular views. You'll find

routes across the district, with three towns – **Bingley, Baildon** and **Burley in Wharfedale** – holding Walkers are Welcome status.

Canal Adventures

The Leeds - Liverpool Canal is the perfect place to take a stroll or cycle. Its route connecting Keighley, Bingley, Saltaire and Shipley, known as the Airedale Greenway, takes in some magnificent countryside, industrial heritage and iconic feats of engineering such as the Five Rise Locks.

Literary Landscape

Haworth is a popular destination for walkers with fabulous scenery and 'must do' hikes, including the iconic route to **Top Withens**, said to be the inspiration for Emily Brontë's Wuthering Heights. The village itself is surrounded by the gorgeous Pennine countryside, with plenty of shorter walks starting out from Haworth village.

Moorland Meanders


Bradford is surrounded by stunning moorlands, all of which offer great views and an intriguing history, making the district incredibly popular with walkers. On historic Ilkley Moor you can discover carved 'cup and ring stones' which date back to the Bronze Age, hidden amongst the heather.

Designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site, visit Saltaire for spectacular architecture, wonderful art, independent shops and restaurants.

Saltaire takes its name from its founder, Sir Titus Salt, and the River Aire, which runs through the village. Sir Titus Salt rose from modest beginnings to become one of the most successful industrialists of the Victorian age, leaving this fine village as his legacy. Architects Lockwood and Mawson designed the entire village in a classical style, inspired by the Italian Renaissance.

There is world class art on display at Salts Mill with one of the largest collections of David Hockney's art. And all of this surrounded by countryside and moors.

Events contribute to a thriving arts scene, including Saltaire Arts Trail, Festival and Living Advent Calendar.

Close to Saltaire you'll find Shipley and Baildon, where you will find plenty of places to eat, drink, shop and stay. Shipley provides excellent transport links, an open market and various attractions including a swimming pool and bowling alley.

Up the hill, Baildon has a small town centre that includes a number of pubs, restaurants and cafés. It also leads onto Baildon Moor, which is great for walking, with some fantastic viewpoints.



Explore



Salts Mill and 1853 Gallery

Salts Mill is a former 19th-century textile mill. This historic site has been transformed into a haven for art, culture, and leisure. As you step inside Salts Mill, you are immediately greeted by its grandeur and architectural beauty. The mill's vast space is filled with a variety of shops, galleries, and dining.

See the 1853 Gallery, one of the largest collections of David Hockney's art, with a permanent exhibition of over 300 of his works, demonstrating the large range of styles and techniques used by the Bradfordborn artist.

Continue through the mill onto the second and third floors where you will find 'The Arrival of Spring' by David Hockney and People & Process where objects and images take visitors through the history of Salts.

Roberts Park

Shipley Glen Tramway

Shopping

Saltaire has a surprisingly varied retail offering, with a number of specialist outlets and boutique shops. This is thanks largely to the impressive Salts Mill building which houses a number of excellent retailers including The Home, Kath Libbert Jewellery, and All Terrain Cycles.

Elsewhere in Saltaire visit Victoria Road and Bingley Road for some fabulous independent shops, such as **Giddy Arts**, **Serendipity**, **Too Good to Use** and the **Saltaire Vintage Shop**, showcasing quality fashion, homewares and vintage choices.





Bingley Five Rise Locks

Bingley Five Rise Locks are one of the most spectacular features on the Leeds Liverpool Canal. They are the steepest staircase locks in the country and feature in the seven wonders of the waterways. The locks boast stunning views of the Aire Valley with a café waiting for you at the top. A little further down the towpath are the Three Rise Locks. Together they form a very popular spot to ride your bike, take a walk or enjoy a spot of fishing.
