ABOUT Saltaire

Saltaire takes its name from its founder, Sir Titus Salt, and the River Aire, which runs through the village.

Thanks to its preservation as a model village, Saltaire was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2001.

Visit for spectacular architecture, independent shops and restaurants. There is world class art on display at Salts Mill with one of the largest collections of David Hockney art and all surrounded by countryside and moors. Events contribute to a thriving arts scene, including Saltaire Arts Trail, Festival and Living Advent Calendar.






Heritage Trail



1 01	Our tour begins on the bridge over the railway line. Look down Victoria Road towards the countryside beyond the village. Salt's most influential idea was to relocate his entire business to a greenfield site in order to escape the chaos of Bradford.
1 02	Bradford was a crowded and unhealthy place to live with limited space for a factory on the scale Salt envisaged. Continue downhill along Victoria Road, passing the impressive 2 Saltaire United Reformed Church on the left until you reach the canal bridge. Despite its rural location Saltaire was not isolated. Salt wanted to distribute his products quickly and cheaply so he chose a site with excellent transport links. The Mill was built beside the railway, the motorway of the nineteenth century. The canal linked the village to Leeds and Liverpool and there were good local road connections.
Ŕ	Turn left down the ramp and follow the path around to the right to cross the River Aire by the modern footbridge. Salt believed leisure was good for his workers' health, particularly as a distraction from the temptations of alcohol.
1 03	Roberts Park was included in Salt's plans from an early stage and it was completed in 1871. Retrace your steps back to the Railway Bridge and look towards the mill chimney.
*	Can you feel a breeze behind you? Salt was concerned about the harmful effects of smoke produced by factories and located his mill where the prevailing westerly winds would blow the smoke away from the village.
1 05	The Mill is clearly separated from the housing by the allotments where workers could grow their own food. This zoning approach was copied at other company towns and is echoed today by concentrating noisy and dirty businesses in industrial estates.
*	Turn around and walk down the cobbled Albert Terrace. Then turn left into William Henry Street. The three storey houses originally provided shared lodgings for single workers. Small front gardens and more spacious houses were provided for the 'overlookers', the foremen of the factory floor.

Ŕ	Turn right onto Caroline Street. Here the front doors of the properties open straight onto the street indicating that they were for lower paid employees. As you walk along you will see the streets branch off at regular intervals.
1 06	This grid pattern was chosen to use the available land efficiently. Although the houses are close together, architects Lockwood and Mawson ensured that their height in relation to the width of the road allowed each house to receive ample daylight.
*	Continue to the junction with Albert Road. Here turn left uphill. First you will pass a row of 'overlookers' houses before finding the grandest semidetached residences, home to the company's executives, teachers and the church minister. Originally, they had fine views over open country. At the top of Albert Road, turn left and use the zebra crossing to cross Saltaire Road.
1 07	Continue straight ahead and then walk left around the corner to reach Bingley Road. Continue along Bingley Road and then turn left into Victoria Road. Grouped around Alexandra Square are 7 the Almshouses. This pleasant green is one of several open areas located at regular intervals along Victoria Road.
1 08	Spaces like these were normally found only in the most affluent areas of Victorian towns. Continue downhill until you reach the crossroads, where the former 8 Hospital building stands at the corner. Use the pedestrian crossing to continue along Victoria Road.
1 09	You will soon reach two of the finest buildings in the village, the School 9 on the left and the Institute 10 on the right. They are set back from Victoria Road with an open space in front to form Victoria Square. Named in honour after the Queen, Victoria Road linked all the community facilities and important buildings together, creating another distinct zone within the village.
*	Continue along Victoria Road past the row of shops to complete your tour where it began at the railway bridge.



Salts Mill & 1853 Gallery

The Grade II Listed historic mill building was built in 1853 by Sir Titus Salt along with the village to house his workers. The Mill is now a place for art, shopping and dining, with free entry and parking.

Salts Mill is home to the 1853 Gallery, one of the largest collections of David Hockney's art, with a permanent exhibition of over 300 works by Hockney, demonstrating the large range of styles and techniques used by the Bradford-born artist.

Continue through the mill onto the second and third floors where you will find 'The Arrival of Spring' by David Hockney and People & Process where objects and images take visitors through the history of this iconic mill.

Roberts Park

Saltaire United Reformed Church

A Grade-I listed building in the heart of Saltaire, the United Reformed Church is a site to behold. Completed in 1859, the church is an outstanding example of Italianate religious architecture.Sir Titus Salt is interred in the mausoleum.

Shipley Glen Tramway

The Shipley Glen Cable Tramway is the oldest working cable tramway in Great Britain.

Bingley Five Rise Locks

Bingley Five Rise Locks is one of the most spectacular features on the Leeds Liverpool Canal. They are the steepest staircase locks in the country and feature in the seven wonders of the waterways. The locks boast stunning views of the Aire Valley with a cafe waiting for you at the top. A little further down the towpath are the Three Rise Locks.

Together they form a very popular spot to ride your bike, take a walk or enjoy a spot of fishing.

Shopping

Saltaire's retail offering is surprisingly diverse for such a small village, including a number of specialist shops and boutiques. Visit the magnificent Salts Mill, housing a variety of excellent shops such as Kath Libbert Jewellery, Early Music Shop and All Terrain Cycles. Wander through the Salts Book and Poster shop and check out The Home, a luxury homewares and furniture shop.

Walk up Victoria Road and discover the delights of **Radstudio**, a design and art led shop offering modern and functional gifts, **Giddy Arts**, an independent craft gallery, refill shop and speciality coffee bar, **Mr**. **Whetstone** low waste sustainable/refill store cupboard and the **Saltaire Vintage Shop**, just a few of the wonderful shops in Saltaire.

On Bingley Road further up the hill you'll find a variety of independent shops including Walk in Style selling quality fashion, Evans of Saltaire jewellers, Too Nice To Use and Serendipity for an amazing selection of



gifts. If you are feeling creative, call into **Salt Pots** where you can design and paint your own pottery.

The Aire Valley is home to a fantastic selection of markets that showcase the best local producers. Take a trip to **Saltaire Farmers Market, Bingley Artisan Market, Baildon Farmers Market or Shipley Market.** So explore the area and enjoy some time to browse the shops and markets there are on offer.



The Great Outdoors

There are many self-guided walks around Saltaire that are accessible for all abilities, including long distance hikes, or you can simply meander through **Roberts Park** and enjoy the beauty and tranquillity. Saltaire is located just a few miles from the 'Walkers Are Welcome' towns of Baildon and Bingley. When you arrive, you can expect to be greeted warmly by businesses that are familiar with your hiking needs.

Walk to **Shipley Glen** beyond Roberts Park, take Higher Coach Road to ride the Shipley Glen Tramway or walk uphill through the woods. Follow Prod Lane and turn left past The Glen Public House & Café to access the fabulous landscape.

Explore the **Airedale Greenway.** Titus Salt deliberately built Saltaire close to the Leeds Liverpool Canal and railway line so that he could distribute his products quickly and cheaply. Today the canal is used for leisure and has an excellent towpath to Bingley and Leeds, and forms National Cycle Network

Route 696. This route provides a fantastic opportunity to explore part of the longest canal in Britain. Take in beautiful countryside, rich industrial history and stunning scenery on a peaceful journey.

Follow the **Aire Valley Sculpture Trail**, which starts at the bridge on Victoria Road and continues along the River Aire between Baildon Bridge and Saltaire. Admire the 15 sculptures, including a submarine, a dinghy dog and an octopus, the round trip takes around 40 minutes. It's easy to walk making it a great trail for families.

An exciting 90-mile hike known as the **Dales High Way** takes you through the glorious high country of the Yorkshire Dales. The walk starts at Saltaire and follows bridleways, greenways and old trade routes north to Appleby-in-Westmorland.

What's On

There's always something happening in the village of Saltaire. One of the best times to visit is in September for the annual **Saltaire Festival**, a 10-day celebration of music and arts.

The **Saltaire Arts Trail** is a popular event where local artists open their homes and showcase arts and crafts from across Yorkshire, with the Maker's Fair the highlight.

Saltaire Farmers Markets are held regularly throughout the year, as are gigs at The Live Room, Rose & Brown Vintage Home & Fashion Fairs and guided walks at the nearby Bracken Hall Countryside Centre.

Food and Drink

Saltaire is a foodie's paradise where you can dine in trendy bars or restaurants, cosy cafés and anywhere in between - a lively cosmopolitan village with an equally vibrant food scene. Here you will find any cuisine you desire, Mediterranean, Indian, British and more.

Victoria Road in the village offers a wide variety of places to relax and dine, such as **Cultures Deli and Drafthouse** with cheese platters and draft beer. **Don't Tell Titus** is a stylish bar and restaurant with fantastic Indian/fusion menus. **The Boathouse** on the banks of the River Aire serves pub classics.

Bingley Road is home to many hip and independent eateries. If you crave burgers, try **Rumpus Burger**, contemporary dining with an upscale burger menu. Neapolitanstyle pizzas are served at **il Pirata Pizzata**, along with craft beer. For fine dining day or night, there is a new café/restaurant, **The Pepper Mill**, serving seasonal and local produce. For something spicy reserve a table or order take out from **Jinnah Bistro**. Saltaire has a thriving café scene. You can find **The Quaffery, Tambourine Coffee**, and other places on Bingley Road. You can also walk down Victoria Road to **Digin's Hut** and the popular **Salts Diner**, along the canal to **Higher Ground** coffee shop at Hirst Lock, or to Roberts Park to the **Half Moon Café**. **Edward Street Bakery** is a great place to visit for brunch and specialty coffee from nearby roasters.

Take a stroll to the town of Shipley - a short 10-minute walk from the village.

Visit Aagrah, an award-winning restaurant specialising in Kashmiri cuisine, as well as other popular options including **Tapas Tree** and **The Waterside Restaurant and Bar.**

At the end of the day, unwind with a drink in one of Saltaire and Shipley's highly rated and award-winning pubs, alehouses and breweries including gems such as Fanny's Ale House, SALT Beer Factory, Cap and Collar, The Fox, Saltaire Brewery and many, many more.
